Klaus is one special cat – and he's got the papers to prove it. As far as anyone knows, he is the first and only alumnus of The Cat House to be certified as a therapy cat. His job is helping Bethany Szydlowski stay calm and confident when her husband, Mick, has to travel for work.

See, Bethany struggles with anxiety. Before Klaus came to live with the Szydlowskis, she coped with Mick's absences by going to stay with her parents. Now, because of a cat with a scrunched up ear. who once lived on the street and was so sick he nearly died, Bethany has the freedom to stay in her own home and Mick can do his job without worry. "It's amazing and it's helped so much," Bethany said, "I can talk to him and tell him when I feel overwhelmed."



Their conversations typically begin when she gets home from work. "Hello, Klaus," Bethany says. Purr, meow, Klaus replies. "How was your day?" Purr, meow. And it continues from there. Klaus knows when Mick is gone and sticks close by Bethany at those times. When Mick is home, Klaus is more likely to take off for a nap by himself. The qualities that earned Klaus his certification weren't immediately apparent when he was found living with a group of feral cats near a northeast Lincoln business. Klaus wasn't feral, he was friendly to people. But he was thin and sickly, with such severe diarrhea that the veterinarian worried he would not make it. He did, though, and The Cat House took him in.

There he continued to recover and his personality blossomed. Then known as Neffer, he was a favorite among the volunteers. He showed his clever side also. The Cat House even had to develop a special "Neffer lock" after he figured out how to get his room door open so he could wander blissfully around the halls.



When Mick and Bethany came to The Cat House looking for a cat, they instantly fell in love with Klaus' outgoing personality. They brought him home Dec. 10, 2006, and have been discovering his special qualities ever since. First, they found that Klaus absolutely loves people. No matter how many people come to visit, he's right there in the middle of the group. With regular guests, he has special routines. This toy for Bethany's mother. The foam ball for a game of soccer with another friend.

He also knows and obeys commands: Jump up, get down, come here, let's go for a walk. At that last command, he runs over to the door where his harness is kept. Put it on and he's ready to go for a walk to the mailbox or a trip to Petco to ride in the cart, see the birds and shop for food. He even went for a ride once back and forth across the kitchen on Mick's skateboard. It was last July that Mick and Bethany got the idea of having Klaus certified. They thought it might help them in looking for housing. Bethany's doctor encouraged them and arranged to get it done. Klaus, naturally, aced the certification tests. A special cat, indeed.

Spotlight on.... Susan Merrill

One story tells you everything about Susan Merrill's passion for helping the cats at The Cat House. It was late on Christmas Eve. Susan was in the hospital recovering from serious health problems. A nurse stopped by and wondered about the jar of catnip on Susan's bedside table. The catnip was there, of course, so Susan could keep stuffing catnip sticks from her hospital bed. The popular sticks help raise money for The Cat House. Susan wound up stuffing and selling two sticks that night for the nurse to give her daughter's new cat on Christmas.

Susan got involved with The Cat House out of concern for the 80 or so cats that Animal Control seized from a home on South Street. The Cat House took in several of those cats. Susan's first effort was putting out donation jars to raise money for the cats' care. Then she started taking home laundry. Next she began fostering kittens, especially kittens of mothers who had become wild, or feral. By her count, she has fostered 34 kittens and managed to let 30 of them go for adoption.

Soon she was doing all that plus reorganizing files, helping with open hours, stuffing catnip sticks, doing spot cleaning, staffing tables at various events, arranging to get donations by collecting Best Choice labels and helping trap feral cats so they could be neutered or spayed and released.

"The longer I'm there, the more I want to do and the more I do do," Susan said. "It's a feel-good thing for me. I love cats." Along with her own cats, Susan takes care of some neighborhood ferals, who keep her company during the hours she's outside gardening. When she's not doing Cat House work or digging in the dirt, she works in the air quality section of the state Department of Environmental Quality.

Julie Dahlke got introduced to The Cat House through Suzie Mierdierks. Suzie was on the board of the credit union where Julie works as assistant manager and they soon found they had cats in common. But it was Simba who talked Julie into becoming a volunteer. He was among the cats Animal Control seized from a house on South Street in 2003.

When he arrived at The Cat House, he was bedraggled and very sick. With care, his gorgeous coat was restored and his regal personality shone through. "Once I saw that boy and met that boy, I was hooked," Julie said. She began by taking care of the cats with feline leukemia, the first of which came from the South Street raid.

Next, Julie took on a Friday night cleaning shift along with Suzie. The two often spent hours cleaning and playing, cleaning and playing. Two years ago, she became coordinator for the leukemia-positive cats. About one year

ago, she took on the task of being volunteer coordinator for the whole Cat House. That means she contacts new volunteers, matches them with Cat House needs, schedules volunteers and makes sure the cleaning shifts have enough people. When the shifts are short, it's often Julie who fills in.

"It is possible that some of the cats at Q Street see her more than her family does," said TCH President Faye Stevens. Julie often brings her daughter, Kaitlyn, to help clean and play with the cats. Kaitlyn was six when she started coming in, making her one of the youngest volunteers. Along with her daughter, Julie lives with her husband, a yellow lab and cat Chloe. She also is currently fostering Jillian, a TCH cat that needs insulin twice a day.

Special Rates for Special Adoptions—Come Celebrate Seniors!

Adding a new feline family member to your household is always a rewarding experience. The benefits of adding a bundle of kitten energy to your family are easy to see. Other adopters prefer to adopt an adult cat, who has grown out of the wild kitten stage and whose personality is already known. However, the benefits of adopting a senior cat are far too often overlooked.

Senior, in cat terms, really refers to cats of about 7 or 8 years of age or older. Considering indoor, mixed-breed cats routinely live to be 15 years of age or more, the term "senior" is often misunderstood. It's not uncommon to find a 12-year-old cat racing from one end of your home to another in the evening, or sitting high atop the cat tree "chattering" at the birds outside your window. Advances in veterinary care, diagnostics and nutrition help keep cats healthy, active and playful – even into their 20s!

When you adopt an older cat, not only are you providing a loving home for a cat that is more likely to be passed over in a shelter, but you are getting a loyal companion who will often stay by your side and not shred the curtains! Senior cats blend "established" personality and the ability to adapt to new situations and form strong bonds with their new family. They are still playful and curious, but no longer too busy to sit with you while you read a book or watch a movie.

Over the past winter, The Cat House began a promotion to celebrate seniors. The goal was two-fold: to encourage adopters to consider a senior feline and to reach out to older potential adopters who would enjoy the companionship of a pet, but may have housing requirements or fixed incomes that limit their choices. As there are so many older kitties needing homes, and so many wonderful older adults looking for companions, we've decided to continue the promotion indefinitely.

Adoptions of senior cats qualify for our special adoption rate of \$60. In addition, if you are 60 years of age or older, the adoption of any of our cats is only \$60. So come by and meet our lovable – and playful – cats and help us celebrate seniors throughout the year!



Important Victories for the Animals

Cats and other animals have won important victories in the Nebraska Legislature. One new law increases the penalties for people who abandon or neglect animals if the animals wind up being seriously injured or even die. In those cases, people can be charged with a felony and could face up to five years in prison if convicted. Previous law made abandonment or neglect a misdemeanor, no matter what happened to the animals.

A second new law requires inspections every two years for cat- and dog-breeding operations, pet stores, licensed dealers, boarding kennels and animal shelters. The law also increases the number of state employees assigned to the inspection program and gives the state more options for penalizing problem breeders and facilities. Previously, the state had only one inspector for 721 license holders and inspections were done only when the state received a complaint.



Cats More Effective than Cholesterol Medicines

This was the title of an article posted on the EndFatigue.com website, a support site for individuals suffering from Chronic Fatigue Syndrome or Fibromyalgia. Cat lovers, however, probably aren't overly surprised by the title. We've always known that cats have an almost mystical connection to the humans they choose to share their lives with. Lowering cholesterol? Sure why not?

The posted article included the following information:

"A research study found that having a cat can reduce stress in people's lives, and consequently lowers the risk of having a heart attack or stroke or developing a heart disease. The findings are based on a 10-year study, carried out by the researchers at the Stroke Research Center at the University of Minnesota. The study, which looked at 4,435 Americans aged 30 to 75, showed that those who did not have a cat had a 40 percent higher risk of having a heart attack and a 30 percent greater risk of dying from other heart diseases than those who have or have had a cat. ... Several studies have confirmed that owning a pet reduces stress, decreases blood pressure and cholesterol, and reduces risk of depression."

With an estimated 9 million cats and dogs being euthanized every year because homes cannot be found for them, wouldn't adopting a cat be a lot more fun and less expensive alternative to lower your risk of heart disease? Of course, never stop taking prescribed medication without your doctor's authorization.
