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Help for Lincoln Ferals

A former roamer who has found a new family.

Thanks to a new project of The Cat House, one less danger may soon threaten cats that roam the back alleys and wild areas of Lincoln. The Cat House has entered into an agreement with the City of Lincoln to undertake the first city sanctioned, trap-neuter-release project this fall. If all goes well, the hope is that the city will agree to change its policy on dealing with feral cats and adopt the TNR approach citywide, according to TCH Vice President Beth Boal.

"The fact that the city's even doing this pilot is a huge, huge success,"

Boal said. Feral cats are those that have lost their domesticity and reverted to the wild. Current city policy is to capture roaming cats and, because no one claims them and they are judged too wild to be adopted, to kill them. Last year, only 11 percent of cats captured in Lincoln were claimed. Three-quarters of the rest were euthanized.

The policy has cost the lives of countless cats and hasn't worked to control their numbers or stop complaints about them, Boal said. Other cats simply move in to claim the vacant territory, leading to the fights that often cause complaints. Nor does the policy do anything to slow down the population growth. The cats will breed to fill the available food supply. "It leaves a vacuum," Boal said. "You want that one mean, nasty male cat that keeps the others from coming in."

With the TNR pilot project, cats will be captured and taken to All-Feline Hospital. They will be spayed or neutered, vaccinated for rabies and distemper and checked for other diseases. Each will be photographed, given a microchip and eartipped for later identification. The cats will then be returned to the place they were captured, where they have established relationships. The exceptions would be kittens young enough to be socialized. TNR programs have proven successful at controlling cat populations in other places where they have been used. They also can save money for cities by reducing the need for shelters. Such programs are being used in Washington, D.C.; Atlantic City, N.J.; and Salt Lake City and are common in Australia and South Africa.

The Lincoln pilot project will focus on an area near 48th Street and Leighton Avenue. The city will pay The Cat House \$3,000 to administer the project. The Cat House will work with a volunteer or volunteers in the area to trap the cats and monitor the colony. Cats wearing a collar and license tag will be released if trapped and will not be included in the project.

Now, all she needs is a new home and some laps to call her own.



Help for Katrina Kitties

Simba, the "office manager" for The Cat House, knows what it's like to be bedraggled and homeless. In the wake of Hurricane Katrina, The Cat House shared a little bit of comfort with some of Simba's friends who had suffered the same experience in the storm.

On September 7, TCH volunteer Suzie Meierdierks took 22 beds and 12 catnip sticks made by Cat House volunteers with her to Birmingham, Ala. Suzie donated these items to the Greater Birmingham Humane Society on behalf of The Cat House. The North Shore Animal League was bringing in cats and dogs to the shelter by the truckload from areas affected by Hurricane Katrina.



The cat house has several Katrina kitties for adoption. Stop by our P street (soon to be Q street) adoption location for a visit!

A few days later, TCH volunteer Alma Vlasak talked to Heidi Krupp, the director of the St. Francis Animal Sanctuary in Tylertown, Miss. Heidi said people from the Best Friends animal sanctuary were helping out at their shelter. Almost all of the shelter's donor base had been wiped out in the hurricane, but with assistance from Best Friends, they were still able to function. They were receiving more than 100 animals a day. Alma sent 50 beds and 8 carrier liners, again made by TCH friends, to those kitties. The Nebraska Trucking Association paid for shipping the beds and liners by UPS.

The Cat House also is finding new homes for cats from the hurricane hit area. Four cats and four kittens arrived in Lincoln on Sept. 22 and two were promptly adopted! More may be on their way.


